Thus far, \$75,000 has been awarded for the planning grant, which is now being used to solicit public input to determine what is already in place and what is needed. The planning grant will used to secure another \$500,000, a \$250,000 implementation grant per year over the next two years.

Among other things, the planning grant calls for the formation of a 21member advisory committee, site visits to all schools and soliciting feedback from community and education stakeholders, focus groups and school principals, in addition to taking the body mass index of all second, fifth and eighth graders in McDowell County and hiring a project director by March 1.

"If we show what we're doing is working, there is more money out them increased," he said.

Spencer said that McDowell County Schools have a five-year strategic plan with three core goals.
